

7 most common rhetoric devices that can aid you in writing a perfect essay

Rhetorical devices make the paper or essay look attractive and more fun for the reader. The rhetorical devices are useful in making the essay agreeable for the reader. It also compels the readers to think about the things mentioned in the texts from different perspectives.

Language is the first thing that casts a positive or negative image on the reader about the writer's writing style. Smart selection and effective use of rhetorical devices help the writer in making the essay winning and interesting.

You are, perhaps, using rhetorical devices in your daily conversations but, probably are unaware of them. Either you are unaware of the rhetorical devices or you pay less attention to what tactics you use to make your day-to-day conversations more delightful.

This blog will share the 7 most commonly used rhetorical devices which will help you in writing your essay. Mostly the [essay writing service](#) is concerned about the ways that can make the essay look pleasant and attractive to the readers and will keep the reader's attention intact. Rhetoric devices play the role of giving an essay an embellishing look.

There are different rhetorical devices but most of them are not widely used or incorporated by the writers in their essay. Because the writers who possess literary excellence use them more in literary works. However, the most common of all the rhetorical devices is a metaphor.

Metaphor is used by multiple writers because it enhances the appeal of the essay. In literary language, metaphor is defined as a way of describing the thing which does not imply the literal meaning but conveys the meaning of word through comparison, symbolically. For instance, comparing someone's bravery with a lion's bravery is considered as a metaphor not because a girl is a lioness rather to intensify the degree of a girl's bravery.

Another important and widely used rhetorical device is personification. This figurative device basically helps in merging the attributes of humans with non-human objects or even animals. An example of personification could be flowers were dancing or birds were singing. In both examples, human attributes are assigned to flowers and birds.

These rhetorical devices give writers an edge to use as many rhetoric techniques as they can because collectively their purpose is to enhance the appeal of content being written in an essay.

Imagery is the another most commonly used rhetorical device because it helps the reader to enjoy the written content. Since it helps the reader in dwelling into surreal imagination and forget the chaos of world. This device requires descriptive, figurative and embellished language which enables the readers to imagine the scenario explained by the writer.

Simile is the most acknowledged and appreciated rhetoric device. The use of simile in the essay makes it more appealing and helps in grabbing reader's attention for a longer span of time. A simile is basically the figure of speech that helps the writer in drawing a comparison between two entities using words 'like' and 'as'.

An example of a simile would be 'shine as bright as the stars'. The incorporation of simile makes the essay more vivid and powerful for the readers.

Repetition is also one of the commonly used literary or rhetorical device that helps in enhancing and conveying the message of the writer effectively. Mostly this device is used by the writer to either emphasize the word being repeated or to incorporate rhythmic patterns in the essay. In both ways, the writer enhances the engagement of the reader and helps the reader understand the significance of repetitive words or phrases by [paper writing service](#).

Chiasmus is yet another literary figure that is widely used in essays. This technique helps the writer to make readers reflect or think about the things being discussed in the essay. This technique could be categorized as an engaging technique that bridges the gap between writer and reader.

This technique requires the modification and rearrangement of the phrase or words which changes the meaning too. For instance, the real question is what we can do for and not what the country can do for us? The replacement in the order of words have changed the meaning while compelling the readers to think about the idea, subtly embedded in the sentence using chiasmus.

Lastly, Hyperbole is also an effective and commonly used rhetorical device. This figure of speech is used by the writer when they want to add the element of exaggeration in the essay. The element of exaggeration is either used for persuading the audience or to make them imagine the unimaginable. Therefore, in both cases, the hyperbole helps in refining the value of the essay. An example of hyperbole could be 'the worst movie in the world'. In this example, the reader and writer are aware of the fact that there must be innumerable worst movies but the exaggerating element may help the writer to convey the message that perhaps the movie was woeful for '[write my essay](#)' tasks.
